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Mobility Authority Opens Second Phase of 183A Shared Use Path

(Cedar Park, Texas) – Walkers, joggers and cyclists can now get from Leander to Cedar Park and points beyond thanks to the opening of the second phase of the 183A Shared Use Path. The \$3.1 million, five mile project extends along the west side of 183A from RM 1431 north to Hero Way and connects with phase one, a 2.3-mile section that opened in 2011 and runs from South Brushy Creek to RM 1431. The 10-foot wide concrete shared-use path was built by the Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority, which runs the 183A toll road.

Last year the Mobility Authority and Williamson County opened a bridge across South Brushy Creek linking the 183A path to the Brushy Creek Regional Trail. Eventually the Mobility Authority hopes to extend the path further north in Leander to the Capital Metro Leander Rail Station and to the South San Gabriel River. The shared-use path is part of the Mobility Authority's commitment to provide a wide range of mobility solutions to the community.

About the Mobility Authority

The Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority is a local, independent government agency created to improve the regional transportation system. Its mission is to implement innovative solutions that reduce congestion and create transportation choices that enhance quality of life and economic vitality. The Mobility Authority was the state's first Regional Mobility Authority, created in October 2002 to serve Travis and Williamson counties. The Mobility Authority operates the 183A toll road in Williamson County, is constructing the 6.2-mile Manor Expressway east of Austin and will begin an 11-mile
